Below please find the minutes from the joint meeting of members from St. Alban's Vestry and Search Committee and Faith Lutheran's Church Council. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact Arlene White, Senior Warden or Dee Rinehart, Chair of the Search Committee.

Partnership Planning St. Alban's and Faith 8/1/2021

Arlene and Karen explain how we arrived at this point of creating a partnership. Questions and discussion:

- 1. Worship times? Faith is flexible and has talked about possible Saturday evening services, although we currently worship at 11:00 a.m. on Sundays. St. Alban's holds a Rite 1 service Sundays at 8:00 a.m. and a family service using Rite 2 at 10:30 a.m. Each congregation holds only one summer service. Our liturgies are similar and our liturgical calendar is the same.
- 2. How are the logistics going to be handled? Faith needs a preacher for worship and regular pastoral care 10 hours a week and St. Alban's would have 30 hours per week. It was suggested to create a joint council to handle incidentals as they come up. Episcopal Bishop suggested that Lutheran synod meetings would not be necessary for the shared pastor. The shared pastor would not have any administrative responsibilities at Faith.
- 3. Assuaging fears of change? Communication between the congregations and with the pastor is essential; need to emphasize we are not merging the churches this will be a joint ministry which is very important for our larger community.
- 4. How will the search process involve Faith? Episcopal search process was explained: applications go to Dee and then to the Search Committee; the Search Committee conducts the first interview, and then if the candidate moves forward, Faith will be involved with the second interview; one person from Faith will serve on the Search Committee. Then members of the Search Committee visit the congregation where the pastor is serving and invite the pastor to visit the churches. This would be for the purpose of touring the community and visiting with each congregation's leadership. Before the candidate leaves the area, he or she would meet with the Bishop or their designee from the diocese/synod
- 5. This search process will likely be a slow one, it is not something that is rushed into. We will all need time to get to know one another better and learn to work together. This is an opportunity for both churches to have a place in the larger community by working together.
- 6. What will be involved in contract negotiations? Treasurers from both congregations will be involved with this. All points of a contract will be considered health insurance, pension...
- 7. What will timeline look like? Does this shared ministry proposal have the potential to limit or expand the pool of candidates? Written agreement between churches for potential candidates should be the next step. Both synod and diocese agree to explore the joint ministry. We already have some shared ministries: Joseph House, faith-based partners with schools, St. Alban's shared Faith's PFLAG fundraising link.
- 8. Does St. Alban's have online services? A webmaster? Yes, they have Zoom, a webpage and Facebook live streaming and "sort of" a webmaster who does take care of the website. Faith has live services only; they don't have the capabilities or equipment for online services.
- 9. Would we share holiday services that have to be on specific days or times? Possibly.

Hopes:

- A way forward for both congregations
- opportunities for more activities together
- ability to expand outreach ministries
- that we can prove to the world this can be done
- can grow together
- have lots of opportunities to share adult education, VBS, choral concert
- double the opportunities and ministries to serve
- stronger ministries for each congregation
- moving beyond parochialism
- · each achieves calling a wonderful pastor for their church
- excited about having a consistent spiritual leader
- share environmental ministry

Donate blood. Take a child on a nature walk or help her plant a tree. Visit someone in a hospital or nursing home.

The angels, our faithful companions, are sure to be delighted as we share our knowledge of them with one another. Let us let our angelic side shine through, this day, and always!
