April Vestry Highlights

Our Vestry meetings take place on the fourth Tuesday of each month. The minutes are approved at the next regular meeting. So, the synopsis of the meetings will always appear in later newsletters.

The Vestry met on April 22, 2025.

Treasurer: Operating Checking March 31 – Debit: \$18,537.65; Credit: \$15,146.82; Balance: \$30,493.57

The Rector: Margaret reported that we were getting a \$5000 stipend from Interfaith Power & Light, from a grant that they have from NOAA.

The Senior Warden: The Vestry Goal, proposed at the last meeting, was reviewed and affirmed: Vestry Goal: *Encourage two-way communication within the congregation and the community;* the June 8 Brunch with the Vestry was proposed and approved; summer worship schedule: June 6 – August 31; 8 and 9 A.M. services; on June 22 there will be 1 service at 9 A.M. to mark 65 years for St. Alban's.

External Property: Spring Clean-up date is -5/17 8-noon

Internal Property: Fire Marshall performed inspection; air conditioning check-up is due; Society of St. Andrews was given a key too Parish Office to facilitate mail handling; battery recycling bin is in parish hall

Finance: St. Paul's Berlin and St. Alban's will perform each other's audits; stewardship plans are underway; review of building use cost will be ready for May meeting

Communications: Webpage – Omnitech Pro will host website; Photos of parishioners on parish sites should be posted with permission; welcome bags now include cards with seeds and church photos



Care of Neighbor - Joseph House - Shelly Madsen, Vestry Liaison

The Chesapeake Housing Mission (CHM) is a non-profit Christian organization committed to building safer, healthier homes for low-income seniors and individuals with disabilities on Maryland's Eastern Shore. Their mission is to foster independence and well-being by providing free accessibility modifications for those facing mobility challenges, particularly seniors and disabled residents who wish to age in place. They specialize in wheelchair ramps, grab bars, handrails, and other fall-prevention measures to enhance mobility and prevent injuries.

St Alban's has been doing volunteer build projects with CHM for many years. Our spring volunteer project was on May 9, and we built a small deck and set of stairs. The Salisbury homeowner, Ms. Hudson, has severe arthritis and is greatly appreciative of having safer access to her house. Thank you to the volunteers who donated a morning of their time. It was great to have four new volunteers, including Chris and Erica Howard, Jim Gottschalk and his friend Scott, as well as long-time volunteers: Jim Cockey, George Demko, Howard Doak, Charles Dimola, and Shelly Madsen.

Our Story

The first new mission in the Diocese of Easton in more than a century, St. Alban's Chapel came to be a reality in 1960, created by Salisbury Parish, St. Peter's, and overseen by their Chapel Committee. Among the members of the committee was G. William Truitt, who became our first vicar. During the planning stages, Richard H. Hodgson negotiated the purchase of the land our parish buildings occupy. Mr. Hodgson has since become a major benefactor of St. Alban's and the other Episcopal churches in Wicomico County.

The new chapel was struggling with membership and with finances when The Rev. Guy Butler came to be our vicar. Serving from 1961 until 1965, Father Butler saw St. Alban's through a time when there was a question about the chapel's viability.

In 1966, Charles Mason became vicar. Under Charlie's leadership, the chapel gained its independence from St. Peter's in 1968-69 and parish status in 1971. It is from this time that St. Alban's developed its passion for **social justice**. Father Mason left St. Alban's in 1976.

Since then, our parish has been blessed with growing stability in membership and finances. The Rev. Joseph M. Clark became our second rector in 1977 and served our congregation until 1985. Joe led us into the **servant ministry**. During his tenure as rector, our involvement with twelve-step groups and the Joseph House ministries blossomed. It became apparent that we were outgrowing our space and began to look at expanding our physical plant. Father Clark earned his Doctor of Ministry during his time on sabbatical at St. Alban's.

Our next rector was the Rev. M. Douglas Girardeau, who came to us in the fall of 1987. Doug shared that he was advised to avoid St. Alban's, as we were a church that had worn out its old parish hall by welcoming community groups who needed meeting space. He decided that we just might be the parish for him. The decision had been made to address our "informal communion space," our parish hall, and add an office and choir room before Doug arrived. Doug led us through the construction of our new parish hall, and involvement with twelve-step groups grew as did our involvement with the Joseph House. We had volunteers who worked each week at the facility, and we began to serve a meal once each month to the homeless. During his tenure, St. Alban's became, and continues to be, involved at the diocesan level of leadership. The parish began an involvement with Habitat for Humanity. Between 1997 and 1998, St. Alban's undertook a study and redesign of our worship space to become *accessible to the physically handicapped*. Doug retired in 2000.

Another important person in the life of our parish was Reese Rickards, who came to St. Alban's in 1993 as a member and served as a deacon in our diocese. Reese kept the needs of the world in front of our congregation, and he was instrumental in forming the Diocesan School for Total Ministry. A great storyteller who possessed a great sense of humor, Reese was generous with his time and talents. He lived fully into his calling as a deacon. Aside from his many gifts of the spirit, Reese had gifts with technology and



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introduced St. Alban's to the internet. St. Alban's community was strengthened by Reese and Jean's presence among us, and their ashes rest in our columbarium. St. Alban's called the Rev. Frieda L. Malcolm to be its fourth rector in 2002 during which time she earned her Doctor of Ministry degree. Our parish continued to grow in stability and ministries. Our social justice and servant ministries flourished, and Frieda led us to an awareness of *creation care*. Solar panels were installed as we aspired to become a "Green Church." Vestry meetings became organized around parish goals and mission, and vestry members became accountable for their areas of concentration. Outreach to the community and social justice ministries grew. Frieda repeated service as a delegate to the General Convention. In her last years as rector, the parish formed a committee to study the improvement of our organ, as the music ministry at St. Alban's is important. The digital organ enhancement of our existing pipe organ was accomplished in 2018.

The parish became more serious about outreach, and in 2008 we began to have a fundraiser to provide funds for community, national, and international service organizations. Over the years, we raised and donated almost \$100,000. The Very Reverend Doctor Frieda Malcolm retired in the summer of 2018.

The Rev. Margaret S. Brack, our current rector, came to St. Alban's in 2022. Margaret also serves as the pastor of Faith Lutheran Church, ELCA. Margaret shares our commitment to social justice, servant ministry, care of neighbors, and creation care. The Holy Spirit moves in our parish. Our congregation has discerned and raised four people to the vocational diaconate and four people to the priesthood. Social justice, servant ministry, physical accessibility, and creation care have become part of the St. Alban's identity, and we are open to what the Holy Spirit has in store for us in the future.

Ray Zeigler

Ray Zeigler was hired as organist/choirmaster at St. Alban's in 1967 before we even got fully moved to Salisbury. I joined the choir as an alto. In the mid-1970s, Ray left St. Alban's for a time and played at other community churches.

In 1983 St. Alban's organist position was again vacant. Ray formally applied and was clearly the best choice for the job. By this time, we had divorced but we worked closely together as coparents of Bryan and Susan.

Fr. Clark and the senior warden at the time asked me how I felt about the situation. "WellIll, if you hire him, I'll have to quit choir, then continuing," if you don't hire him, I'll have to quit choir."

My absence from choir didn't last long. Ray was gathering a group to sing at Katy Hull's funeral and I volunteered. After all, for him it wasn't about singing for Ray Zeigler, it was singing to the Glory of God.

A Story from Carole Wilson

Many of us created colonial costumes for our families for parades and other celebrations, and Carole Wilson was no exception. July 4, 1976, fell on a Sunday, and St. Alban's was planning a celebratory Eucharist. When they arrived at church for the 10:30 service, they found that they were the only ones who had "gotten the memo." Good humor prevailed, and all turned out well. The Wilson family's patriotic spirit was appreciated by all. She laughs about it still as she remembers the story, albeit many years later.
